A very Merry Christmas and a blessed New Year to you all. 2024! How did we get to be so old!

I always enjoy looking at the Christmas adverts- the big budget ones from the major retailers that are like mini epics in their own right. A lost snowman or dragon or carrot or over-worked nurse finds a place and a family who have a table groaning with good things and much festive cheer is had by all. They tell a Christmas story about family, celebration, friendship and food with a subtle, or not so subtle, underlying message that all this can be yours if you spend enough money in their stores.

It is of course a complete lie. No amount of money spent can heal the ache of grief for the people no longer there and sometimes the 'happy families' idea of Christmas can make it worse. There is nothing wrong with the advertising so long as we see it for what it is- persuasion to influence our buying habits- and do not treat it as a goal we have to slave to try and meet. I always try to remember the glamourous woman putting the food on the table in the advert most certainly did not cook it (and it is probably stone cold and painted with food colouring to make it look right for the cameras).

There is another Christmas story. Sometimes the 'happy families' story is so loud it makes the other story seem almost irrelevant, but it shows its worth, slipping into the cracks that form when the brittle and beautiful camera-ready dream falls apart.

That story is about gift and kindness. An unprepared mother, a father racked by doubts, random people going about their everyday, humdrum lives suddenly get drawn into a normal event- the birth of a child, something that happens every day. Like all babies this one is all need and potential, but dreams and visions of angels, messages read in the stars and words remembered from ancient prophecies, suggest that this child's birth could be the proof of something amazing. The God who made the universe loves us as we are. We humans are acceptable and holy before we have bought anything and broken and exhausted as we are. He can heal us and free us and help us with no precondition other than us being willing to accept healing and freedom and help as freely as it is offered to us. It is a gift not a business transaction.

This is my comfort and strength- not just when the mince-pies are burnt and the food is less than perfect and we can't afford many of the things the adverts want to sell us- but for this New Year and all the new years to come,

Broadway Fibre Broadband PCC have been meeting with Voneus (who have taken over Broadway) – there will be a formal rollout of plans in the New Year.

Footpaths and Beach Continuing issue with dog mess on the Musslewick path. Cllr CJ confirmed National Parks are unable to support and contacting PCC would be the next steps.

Positive responses to recent beach cleaning. A proposal was made to make Red beach sacks available at specific points across the community. To be followed up.

Action taken to investigate the use of stickers used by Dale on their bins asking for litter only to prevent fly tipping / misuse of bins.

Recreation Area / Playing Fields / Village Hall

The Enhancing Pembrokeshire Grant was now available. Quotes will be obtained for fencing / gate work at the playing field eastern pedestrian access. Also new benches will be considered.

Clock Tower It was confirmed that the clock tower time is correct following recent winter time changes.

Electricity tariff discussed. Clerk to move away from British Gas to a company without a standing charge (Utilita Energy). Failed clock face lighting - options to be considered.

Highways Yvonne Evans provided feedback regarding the cleaning of the drains and ditches. Clerk has passed feedback to the PCC portal.

Concern was raised about parking issues in the Marloes village. LB to take photos and report back in the January 2024 Community Council meeting

Community Councils

National Trust National Trust work has commenced on Marloes Mere. Positive reports from Cllrs and the local community regarding the improvements being made (especially for wildlife and birds).

Toilets

PCC have confirmed the management of the St Brides toilets will continue and be the responsibility of the National Park moving forward. Excellent news for the St Brides Community following numerous attempts from the Community Council to keep the toilet blocks open for locals and tourists. Unfortunately the Marloes village toilets will close in November.

St Brides Walled Garden No updates – action points ongoing

Cllrs not happy with the responses / lack of action from PCNPA. A joint approach with the Church committee will be considered. Cllrs will take photos of lack of up keep to buildings to support actions above.

PROPOSED MERGER OF COMMUNITY COUNCILS

This Community Council resolved as follows: these points will be notified to PCC as part of the Community Council boundaries consultation process.

- Our preferred option is to remain a stand -alone Community Council serving the Marloes and St Brides community
- 2) If a merger is to be required / enforced we propose that, because of the special nature of this Peninsula with its wildlife islands and their visitor traffic, the marine conservation zone, and the amount of correspondence with the Park, the National Trust, Trinity House, etc, the maximum workable merger is the three community councils of Dale, Marloes & St Brides, and St Ishmaels.
- 3)PCC, in planning a merger, would have to give very careful consideration to the matter of community assets such as playing fields, to be sure that the interests of indi-

vidual communities were always upheld.

- 4) In any case, any merger should be planned to reflect the Coastlands School catchment area

SEWAGE PROBLEMS:

Following many meetings with Welsh Water and the clerk and after it was discovered that a chunk of wood had been found in the lower part of the system, it is hoped that the emissions from the inspection chamber in Lower Grove Road will be solved. At a site meeting with Highways Street Care dept. of PCC, the clerk was told that ongoing investigations into if, or where, road water run-off was entering the sewers were in progress. St Brides Haven W.C.s: Staying open, with responsibility transferred to the National Park Authority; this ties up with the NPA being responsible for car parking at this location.


Marloes village W.C.s: Permanently closing; the buildings will "mothballed" (programme of minimum maintenance), with PCC retaining ownership.







CHERISH AND THE ALBION

The EU-funded CHERISH project, a co-operation between Irish and Welsh archaeologists and geographers, researched the impact of Climate Change on historic coastal sites. Marking its completion, on Nov 15th Dr Toby Driver of the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Wales (RCAHMW) visited from Aberystwyth to deliver to Marloes Village Hall a CHERISH-funded display panel, which tells the story of the wreck of the Bristol paddlesteamer *Albion* in 1837. A duplicate of the one soon to go on display at Marloes Sands car park, Dr Driver was donating the display panel to the village of Marloes to recognise the assistance given to the RCAHMW CHERISH team by community members. They had researched the *Albion* story, photographed rarely-visible machinery remains when conditions permitted, and recorded, and sometimes saved from beach bonfires, wreck timbers revealed at Neptune's whim!


This extremely large caterpillar was found by a lady in Dale when she was putting large quantities of bindweed in the compost bin.

It is the caterpillar of the Convolvulus Hawk Moth, which, unsurprisingly eats convolvulus, also know as bindweed.

You may remember me writing here about the adult Convolvulus Hawk-moth and my efforts to catch them. They are a real giant but rather dull in colour. They are a migrant to the UK and rarely breed here so this caterpillar was a very interesting sighting.

Short-eared Owls

The first time I saw a Short-eared owl I had no idea what I was looking at. Peter and I were on a camping holiday in Scotland and were newly-fledged birdwatchers – we had recently purchased the Observers Book of Birds and using this had been able to distinguish Buzzards (common and sitting on telegraph poles) from Golden Eagles (huge, only seen once in the far distance). But what was this bird of prey flying like a big pale brown moth over the moorlands?? It wasn't a Buzzard we were quite good at identifying them now - and we just couldn't find another bird of prey which fitted the bill. It was a while before the penny dropped – it wasn't



a bird of prey, it was an owl! An owl with beautiful long patterned wings drifting over the moors during the day. It was a Short-eared Owl.

The Short-eared Owl regularly hunts during the day (it also hunts at night), and this makes it one of our more visible owls. There are parts of eastern England where, in winter, it is very easy to see a Short-eared Owl hunting over marshes and fields - this is because numbers in the UK are swollen by birds which arrive from Scandinavia, avoiding the harsh winters there. In Scotland in the summer they breed on the moors and again can be seen quite easily. But what about in Wales? Well Short-eared Owls are very much birds of open rough grassland and heath, nesting on the ground usually under the shelter of heather, bracken or tall grasses. They will also breed in young forestry plantations. Areas with high populations of small mammal prey and a lack of disturbance, including disturbance from ground predators are key to their success. Given these requirements, it is perhaps not really surprising that Short-eared Owls are a scarce breeding bird in Pembrokeshire. Such "optimal" breeding habitat occurs mainly on the offshore islands and for a number of years Skomer has been home to one or two breeding pairs. Once, in 1993, 12 pairs nested there – it must have been a peak year for Skomer Voles!

On one overnight visit to Skomer I was lucky enough to see the courtship display in the evening - the male flies around in circles, going ever higher, then stoops and loops whilst calling his loud hoo-hoo-hoo call and wing clapping. All quite spectacular and quite unexpected from an owl!

Short-eared Owls nest on the ground and keep a low profile when breeding. Many a Skomer visitor has been quite unaware that they are sharing the island with such a charismatic bird. And they are indeed

charismatic. They have wonderful staring yellow eyes and beautifully marked plumage. It is one of those birds which makes your day better when you see it. And it is possible to see a Short-eared Owl around here. They are sometimes seen at Marloes Mere, and over the grassy areas on the south of the peninsula. We have seen one just once from our garden, hunting over the marshes below. Further afield they can be sighted at Dowrog Common,
