A story from the Ukraine

As I write this the terrible war in the Ukraine is still causing horrific injuries, destruction of property and loss of life both for Russians and Ukrainians as it has for very nearly a year.

We have prayed and prayed for peace with justice but, so far, that has not been possible.

But recently I was reminded of a story about Vladimir the Great, a prince of Novgorod and Kiev, whose name is shared by the premiers of both the warring nations.

The story goes like this- Vladimir had hoped to make his people, the Rus, great again. He had recalled to them the stories of their heroic ancestors, he had built huge wooden statues of their ancient gods, but still their territory kept being nibbled away by their neighbours and defeat followed defeat. Vladimir couldn't help noticing that these neighbours did not worship many gods, only one, so he sent an ambassador back and forth shopping for a new religion for the Rus.

At first they recommended Islam- strong moral code, great for uniting people, history of great warriors and emperors but they drank no alcohol. "Ridiculous!" shouted Vladimir. "Alcohol is the milk of the Rus. We will freeze without it. Try again."

They did not try too hard with Judaism. They knew how he would react to the idea of circumcision.

Finally they came to Constantinople. They were drawn into the worship of the great church (as it was them) Hagia Sophia. The music, the lights, the atmosphere all enthralled them and when they returned to Vladimir they said, "We did not know whether we were in Heaven or on Earth". The King decided this must be the religion for them because "nothing moves the heart of the Rus like beauty". So Vladimir, his family and, it is said, all the people of Kiev, were baptised in the Dinipro River.

Among my prayers is that the hearts of the war-hungry will be turned again by beauty and by the faith they claim to share.

Community Issues: Broadway Fibre Broadband

No updated correspondence received to the Community Council regarding Broadway Fibre Broadband.

Cllr CJ has received phone calls regarding Broadway from members of the Community, explaining they have expressed to Broadway they can use Western Power poles (Broadway deny knowledge of this). Nick Skudder confirmed Broadway wish to put pole up at the entrance of his farm. Cllr SP confirmed Broadway has sent a surveyor to St Brides to look at possibility of routing Broadway cable underground and erect poles near to the St Brides public toilets.

Cllr CJ discussed the possibility of speaking to a contact in PCC (Darren) that supported the project when it first started. CJ to look for correspondence information for Darren in PCC.

Footpaths and Beach (999 phone)

Dog bin action point discussed. County Councillor Reg Owens to follow up on dog bin with PCC. Clerk emailed Reg Owens following the last Community Council meeting. 999 phone action point discussed. BT are aware of the issue, have permission to replace, we are just awaiting a date of installation. Cllr CJ confirmed a Beach clean on the 5th March 2023 and will be advertised in the Peninsula Papers

Mark Burton letter sent confirming support of playground park equipment. Cllr CJ confirmed Vicky Swell (National Parks) will be speaking to Mark Burton about

the possibility of planting hedge plants and using sheep wire behind the Marloes public toilets to prevent Children in the playing field getting hurt.

Highways Clerk has followed up on all Claire Williams recommendations from previous meeting action points.

Rubbish Bin (used for household

waste): Cllr CJ to write to the Peninsula Papers to report the issue and ask local residents to use local bins appropriately.

Toilets: Clerk has replied to PCC recommending the National Park take responsibility at St Brides.

Cllr updates: Cllrs wanted to make everyone aware of Yvonne (previous Clerk) New Year's Honours and the incredible work Yvonne has done for the community over 42 years of clerking. LB to send a piece sharing the incredible news with Peninsula Papers.

Planning matters: Cllr CJ and PS have drafted a letter to send to PCNP regarding the outstanding planning applications.

NP/22/0488/SCR National Trust: Trehill/ Marloes Mere re-routing of track.-Determined

NP/22/0367/FUL Foxdale Guest House & Campsite Marloes Replacement toilet & showers, upgrade 5 touring pitches to mobile pods, change of use of redundant annexe and upgrade/replacement of ancillary static caravan. Recommended for Approval

NP/22/0314/FUL — Philbeach Farm SA62 3QU - Conversion of redundant RAF wireless building which has been used for agricultural storage but is now in a bad state of repair into holiday let use. Contrary to LDP Policy 7 — likely to be sent to Members under extended delegation for decision or a future Committee meeting

NP/22/0186/FUL – Musselwick Farm - Creation of new field access with new 4.6 metre wide gate on north side of road between Marloes & Martins Haven. Approved, but

major discrepancy between stated method and approved plans. Determined NP/22/0240/FUL – Lower Ripperston Farm, St. Brides, Haverfordwest, Pembrokeshire, SA62 3AH The proposed demolition of the modern farm buildings, and the construction of a replacement new build dwelling etc. Committee Members visiting site in January – February determination at DM Committee NP/22/0656/FUL - Anchor Cottage. Proposed alterations, extension & cladding.

Items discussed at the last meeting in December included:

Broadway: A letter has now been sent highlighting the concerns the Council has over numerous telegraph poles that have been erected seemingly without permission.

Parking/Highways: A copy of the license for planting bushes around the Henry Tudor stone and triangle has finally been found by PCC. This means that something can now be put back on the triangle where the previous bushes failed. It was agreed to re-plant before the spring if possible.

It was proposed that the 20mph roll out for next year be extended out from the village to the Gann carpark. This road is currently national speed limit, and this seems ridiculous given that it is used so frequently by pedestrians and that it is the Coastal Path.

Planning

NP/22/0577/FUL - 2 Woodside has been granted. NP/22/0464/FUL - 131 Castle Way bespoke parking and turning area has been granted. NP/22/0595/FUL - 157 Castle Way has been approved following new, scaled down plans being submitted.

The Clerk reported that the WI site being cleared has been checked on and it was confirmed that no works should be carried out until FULL planning permission has been

granted.

Village Matters - Toilets - A letter has been received from PCC outlining the upcoming budget cuts and encouraging Community Councils to either cover the cost of the cleaning/maintenance or to take over ownership of the whole building. Councillors discussed the matter and were unanimous in their decision to turn this down at present. In order to cover the cleaning, the precept would have to be more than doubled and it was strongly felt that locals' council tax should not be put up to pay for toilets which they do not need. Dale has Blue Flag Status and Criterion 19 states that an adequate number of toilets should be provided. The public toilets also has the only public Disabled toilet in the village. It is felt that should it come down to it, PCC are unlikely to close Dale over others.

Speeding

Blue Anchor Way continues to be a problem, CM has noted vehicles at night travelling at considerable speeds. Members of the public have reported similar. The speed awareness sign will be followed up once the new 20mph limit comes in next year.

Seagull Sacks

Seagull sacks for grey bin bags are now available to order via the Clerk at a cost of £5.30. The sacks are large enough to hold three grey bags and are made of the same material as the red and blue recycling bags. Anyone interested can contact the Clerk via email dalevillagecc@outlook.com or tel: 07807585414. You can also request replacement recycling bags/containers to be delivered to your home via your PCC My Account online. Broken or damaged hard containers and caddies can be taken back and recycled when the new one is delivered. Alternatively, you can check where replacement bags/containers can be collected from on the Council's website.

NEW WAR MEMORIAL. The clerk reported that he had contacted Ms. Annabel Thomas, after she had offered her help in managing the project, which had formerly presented difficulties in the previously presented form. A letter of qualification from Ms. Thomas to the councillors was circulated, together with a report that she had started the process of fund application from the War Memorial Fund. Ms. Thomas was thanked for her welcome offer.

REPLACEMENT NOTICE BOARDS

Cllr Lynda had completed the necessary forms to the Enhancing Pembrokeshire Fund. On being advised by the clerk that the replacement of boards in the three village locations with suitable new notice boards would be in the region of £4,000, councillors authorised the completion and despatch of the forms by the due date.

CORONATION CELEBRATIONS

After discussion on how the coronation of the king could be marked in the community, it was decided to repeat the well-established gift of mugs to the children of Coastlands School. Clerk to liaise with community councils on the Peninsula.

A.O.B.: Brook Lake Sewer. The inspection cover had again overflowed in the recent heavy rain. The clerk had contacted Welsh Water again and W.W. had again sent a tanker to pump out the blockage. The

clerk was asked to write to W.W. in strong terms, as this was a continuing and serious problem.

Defibrillators. Councillors asked if some training could be given to council members (perhaps for all the Peninsula councillors). Clerk to contact Malcolm Smith-Gosling or Mark Burton

Parking in Upper Grove Road The everpresent problem of parking in Upper Grove Road which was impeding council lorries and emergency vehicles was discussed. Clerk to contact the authorities.

Salting the roads. Cllr John (in absentia) had asked through the clerk that representation made with the Highways Dept. concerning the totally inadequate salt treatment of roads in the village in the recent icy spells.

Help with energy bills for oil users:

A £200 Alternative Fuel Payment (AFP) will be available to help those households in Great Britain who use alternative fuels such as biomass or heating oil to meet energy costs this winter. Most households eligible for the AFP support in Great Britain, will receive payment automatically via their electricity supplier in February, with no need to take any action. Those households who will need to apply for the AFP, for example because they do not have a relationship with an electricity supplier, will be able to do so in February, through the same GOV.UK portal as the one that will be used to apply for support under the EBSS Alternative Funding scheme. CLOCK TOWER

I was pleased to read the article about the Clock in the PenPapers for Dec/Jan 2022 and proud to read about the involvement of my family.

Can I please draw your attention to an error?

William Lawrence Senior (Willie) was my grandfather. However his wife was not Doris, as was stated, but Sarah Ann, my grandmother. Doris was their daughter, my mother and Young Willie their son.

My grandfather died when I was only 5, in 1948, so I have few first hand memories of him. However, my gran kept his memory alive-photos, his poetry, plenty of his carpentry, all in our cottage, known as "Carpenters Cottage". I know my grandfather looked after the clock until his death with the help of my grandmother, Sarah Ann Lawrence during the War. My Uncle Bill (Young Willie) also a carpenter at St Brides, took over the maintenance until his death in 1977.

Our family were involved for over 75 years . Since his death , we have visited the village regularly and my husband and I were pleased to be at the ceremony marking the changes made to the clock when the late David Howells was present.

We are pleased to read that local Jim Titley will continue the tradition as the new custodian of this important landmark.


I know there is lots of work going on in relation to energy costs and power outages but I was hoping we could make sure the message gets out to clinicians, patients etc about the **priority service register** which is a free support service which makes sure extra help is available to people in vulnerable situations. You are eligible if you:

- have reached your state pension age
- are disabled or have a long-term medical condition
- are recovering from an injury
- have a hearing or sight condition
- have a mental health condition
- are pregnant or have young children
- have extra communication needs (such as if you don't speak or read English well)
- need to use medical equipment that requires a power supply
- have poor or no sense of smell
- would struggle to answer the door or get help in an emergency.

You might still be able to register for other reasons if your situation isn't listed. For example, if you need short-term support after a stay in hospital.


WAS IT YOU???????

The 315 service moves to Fflecsi

locations/pembrokeshire/

The 315 bus service will be replaced with a Fflecsi Pembrokeshire Service from Monday 30th January. Customers will be able to place bookings from 23rd January via the Fflecsi App or by phoning 0300 234 0300. Attached is a press release regarding the new service. "As you may be aware, a number of bus services in Pembrokeshire have been operating reduced timetables since the outbreak of COVID-19. The 315 bus service between Dale and Haverfordwest has been operating on a dial-a-ride basis with the exception of the summer period when the full timetable has been operating Monday to Saturday. The number of passengers travelling on the 315 has been very low, especially when it is operating on a dial-a-ride basis. We have received concerns from residents regarding the arrangements for bookings and the restricted travel options. Whilst the numbers have increased during the summer period, they are still considerably lower than pre-COVID. In order to make the service more useable and make the service more sustainable, it is proposed that this service is converted into a demand responsive transport service all year around and operated as part of Fflecsi Pembrokeshire. This will mean that rather than having a fixed route with a fixed timetable it will be available for customers to book to travel anywhere within a set geographical zone, 7.30am - 6.30pm, Monday to Saturday.

The scheme has been operating in North West Pembrokeshire since September 2020 and whilst it took time for passengers to get used to the new operating model, it is now proving to be very successful with the total monthly passenger numbers being over 950 for the past 4 months. By covering a large geographical area the service is able to provide transport opportunities to areas which have never previously had a regular service. Also, by only running the bus when passengers need to travel, it reduces costs. For further information about Fflecsi Pembrokeshire please visit https://www.fflecsi.wales/

The area that we propose covering is shown on the map below in mid-grey, and also the small zones around Broad Haven and Haverfordwest. This will enable customers to be taken directly to where they wish to go to within the zone rather than having to get off at

the bus station and then travelling on another bus. The service will be able to connect with existing fixed services such as the Puffin Shuttle in Marloes and the trains in Milford Haven and Haverfordwest, Customers who have an All Wales Concessionary Bus Pass will still be allowed to travel for free.

Coastlands Local History Group.

I don't think we have had a better start to the year than Simon Hancock's talk on the history of Haverfordwest . A very good crowd heard, via 40 items chosen by Simon, a snapshot of history within the town of Haverfordwest . Items such as the Town Seal through artefacts from local churches, priories and friaries to various charters conferring status on the town gave a clear insight into the important role Haverfordwest played in the history of the County as well as Nationally. It was very clear Hafford has a rich and vibrant history which can be further explored by a visit to the Town museum. This will open somewhere in the town as a 'pop up' museum while work is underway at its usual site.

The talk in February looks more closely at one aspect of the history of Haverfordwest as Andy Shobbrook of Dyfed Archaeology comes and gives us an update on the dig at Ockie Whites into the Medieval Dominican Friary which stood there until the Reformation. The dig has been much reported in the media, - both local and national - so we are very fortunate to hear first hand from one of the archaeological team. Andy is well known to us as he was part of the archaeological study at Town Meadow in Marloes before the new houses were built. 2023 sees a number of anniversaries. One of which is the 50th anniversary of The Dona Marika running aground off Lindsway Bay. We are hoping to liaise with all in St Ishmaels to put together events commemorating this over the weekend of the anniversary. If anyone from any of the villages has any recollections of how this impacted them, or any memorabilia, notes, diaries, photographs they would be happy for us to copy or incorporate in an exhibition we would love to hear from you. January 2023: A Memorable Month for Marine Animals in Marloes.

On 6th January a young otter made itself known to multiple people down at Musselwick. It was a good surf day and several surfers were out to make the most of it. They didn't expect to have an otter follow them up the footpath and literally rest its head against their feet!

This is not normal behaviour for a young otter. But it is typical of an otter that has become separated (abandoned?) by its mother and has yet to learn to fear humans. Otters (there is only one type of otter in the UK, and it can be found in rivers, the sea, and Scottish Lochs) are frequent around our whole coast where they eat fish and eels and crabs and breed in scrubby areas near to fresh water. They are a feature of the Pembrokeshire Marine Special Area of Conservation. They are solitary apart from coming together to breed. Mums tend to have one to a few pups and keep them with them until around a year old. They are weaned at 3 months.

On January 7th the otter made its way into the village, no doubt in search of food. At this point, and after advice from an otter expert, Welsh Marine Life Rescue was called who arrived promptly and transferred it to the care of the RSPCA who already had an otter cub to look after. It turns out that the cub (a male) was 4-5 months old and badly undernourished. I've been in two minds about whether to pass on this information, but here goes. I'm sorry to report that he didn't make it. It turns out that he had a compaction of sheep wool in his stomach and was severely weakened, having not eaten for a long time. Sorry not to be able to report good news but, as the RSPCA said, at least he was found and eventually came into care for warmth and support. Wildlife can be fragile and, like us, may have internal injuries or issues but look fine from the outside. So, whilst it's a sad end to the story, he did bring joy to those who saw him and raised awareness of otters around our coast. They are out there. On 22nd January a small (dead) loggerhead turtle was found by Louise Beal on Marloes Sands Beach. It was a young one with the shell only measuring around 19cm. Interestingly it was around the same size as others washed up in recent months, so quite possibly they were all washed off course at once by the same storm.

These are a rare sight. UK waters are too cold for most turtles, and they can go into cold shock and when washed up they may even appear dead when they aren't. Since November 2022 only 9 loggerhead turtles and 1 Kemp's ridley turtle have been reported in the UK. Of the world's seven marine turtle species, six have been recorded in UK waters. They are the leatherback, loggerhead, Kemp's ridley, olive ridley, green and hawksbill turtles. The leatherback, the largest marine turtle, is the species most frequently recorded in UK waters. Each summer, leatherbacks migrate to UK waters where they feed on jellyfish. The turtle was reported to and collected by Marine Environmental Monitoring, a Partner organisation within the UK Cetacean Strandings Investigation Programme. https://strandings.com/

They say things often come in threes, so what else is in store for us this month?! It would be better if it ended happily for the animals, but this is the natural world and she can be tough. However, these memorable sightings do serve to remind us of the wonder of the natural world. We live in such a beautiful place and can so easily stumble across remarkable things. It may be January but get out there and see what you can find!







Wildlife Watch: Big Garden Birdwatch Preparation

For this month's Wildlife watch, we taught the participants about the birds you'll see in your back garden for the RSPB Big Garden

Birdwatch happening at the end of January, as well as demonstrating how to make birdfeeders out of yoghurt pots and string. We had a fantastic turnout and were very pleased to see both new faces and returning ones too.

Wildlife Watch is the junior section of the Wildlife Trust and is an exciting and safe way to explore and learn about the natural world. The group is run by the staff at Dale Fort Field Studies Centre and takes place on the First Saturday of every month. Participation is FREE. Next month's will be on the 4th February between 2-3:30pm. We will be walking through the countryside outside of Dale village whilst telling the story of the Gruffalo!

More on Robins

The European Robin, as it is now called, is well named. The centre of its distribution is Europe - it breeds from Morocco to Norway and from the Canary Islands to the Urals. It needs dense vegetation, with perches which overlook open areas where it hunts its prey of beetles and many other varieties of creepy crawlies (sorry, invertebrates). We have all seen a Robin drop from its perch a couple of feet off the ground and grab some choice morsel which it has spotted from its lookout.

In the rest of Europe Robins are not tame at all, not like they are in Britain. In fact they are really hard to see in the thick forests which they inhabit. In several European coun-



tries we have heard Robins (the sharp "tic tic" alarm call is very easy to identify) but we have not seen them. So it is a pleasure to watch our garden robins here, going about their daily business with confidence.

If you have been to America or Australia you may have noticed that they also have robins. They are not related to our Robin at all and were named by English settlers who noticed a resemblance. This is definitely excusable in the case of Australia as their robins look a lot like ours – they have patches of red or pink, they are the same shape and size and they can also be quite confiding. Not excusable in the case of America – their robin is a huge great thing and is actually a big thrush which happens to have an orange breast. It is this so-called robin which appears in Mary Poppins in a scene set in the centre of London – how could they get their research so horribly wrong?

Male and female Robins are essentially identical and they both sing — this is quite unusual in temperate-climate birds, but is due to the fact the females set up their own territory during winter and they then sing to defend it. Come the spring they find a suitable male and move into his territory — he then does all the singing for both of them. Some Robins, probably females, move away from their breeding territory in winter. On Skokholm there are no breeding Robins but there are always a number of wintering birds. Because they were ringed on Skokholm they can be identified as the same ones inhabiting the same bush as in previous years. One of these birds, however, was already ringed and it had been ringed in Gateshead — so are they all Geordie birds?

Robins are renowned for fighting each other - they are very territorial and it seems to be the red breast which sets them off. Some research was done a number of years ago and it was found that a robin would even attack a red rag on a stick if it tried to come into his territory. Robins actually have several ways of expressing aggression - if you see two robins leaning back, puffing out their red breasts and singing lustily, you are watching the equivalent of two prize fighters sizing each other up. It is difficult for us to take seriously as their high-pitched tweetling song does not sound very threatening but believe me they are deadly serious!

So please enjoy your garden robins - they are certainly very charismatic little birds.
