

All of which proves they are perfectly normal Brits, but I am a little sad too, because when we dug deeper, we found they all had amazing stories of when God had touched their lives for good which they should let more people know. We all share too many sad stories and not enough good ones. They had felt a complex of things that included - joy, peace, safety, healing, a sense of great beauty, of undeserved love, overwhelming and affirming and improving and very special.

It is a little of what I feel knowing I get to look at these views all year around and stay here. It is part of the job of vicars to bless people and things (like the boats at the start of July) and try to be a source of blessing for the people around them. It is what we wish you every month when we sign off with,

Marloes & St Brides Annual General Meeting (AGM)

Marloes and St Brides AGM was a great success. Chair Louise Beale was elected to continue in the role (approved by all members of the Community Council) and Chris Jessop will continue as Vice Chair.

The Community Council agreed/approved for an advert to be posted / shared with the local community for a seventh (and final) Community Councillor.

Committee roles were assigned to individual councillors and can be found in the AGM minutes on the Pembrokeshire Community Council website.

The Community Council agreed approved for future meetings to be held bi-monthly (next community council meeting 10th July 2023).

May 2023 Community Council Meeting Broadway Broadband Installation: The

Community Council will be requesting a meeting from the Pembrokeshire County Council point of contact for the Broadway broadband installation within the Marloes & St Brides/surrounding areas. The meeting will seek to gather further clarity around the future planning of the broadband installation.

Clock Tower Silencing: The Community Council agreed to the same arrangements as in 2022 to support local businesses with the silencing of the Marloes village clock tower. Correspondence has been sent to the Clock House Team.

Funding has been received from Welsh Government / Pembrokeshire Local Authority to support improvements to the clock tower footpath. The Community Council are extremely grateful and are looking forward to work commencing over the next 6-8 weeks. St Brides Walled Garden: The Park Committee members intend to visit the St Brides Walled Garden and Cottages to familiarise

themselves with the land holding and its assets. Following the visit, PCNPA will arrange a joint meeting involving PNCPA, PCC, Community Council and the Church so that possible options can be discussed: different parties with very different agendas (emergency services, walkers, swimmers, divers, churchgoers etc) have to be accommodated at this very popular location.

Marloes and St Brides Public Toilets:

Pembrokeshire County Council have given positive indication that the local toilet closure across county will be re-visited.

Kings Coronation: Marloes and St Brides would like to say a massive thank you to everyone involved in the Kings Coronation celebrations. The village was beautifully decorated.

Planning: Marloes Mere planning proposal discussed. Cllrs are happy with the plans and will feedback, thanking PCNPA that previous comments/recommendations have been taken into consideration.

Finance: The 2021/22 Full Community Council Audit has been finalised and approved by Audit Wales. The 2022/23 financial accounts have been reconciled and signed off by the Community Council Councillor in the May AGM. The 2023/24 budget has been approved in the AGM and donation cheques issued for the upcoming financial year.

The next Marloes and St Brides Community Council meeting has been set for Monday 10th July 2023.

Notes on the meeting held on 17th May in the Sports Club

MATTERS ARISING:

Sandy Haven Slipway. The clerk reported that P.C.C. Highways Dept. had finally agreed to provide a gully for excess drainage water down the slipway by the wall of Quay Cottage.

WAR MFMORIAL:

The clerk reported the progress made by Annabel Thomas with the War Memorial Trust, as well as with prospective designers for the new memorial. It transpires that funding from the W.M.T. for new memorials is not available, only for repair and renovation of existing memorials. It was decided that the memorial should be situated on the Brookside Green site, rather than Burgage Green, subject to ultimate design approval and all the necessary permissions and structural investigations being completed. It is intended that the project be completed in time for Remembrance Sunday this year. NOTICEBOARDS.

Following the decision last month to provide two new noticeboards for the Coastlands School and Burgage Green sites, the meeting approved a quote of £1,400 for the boards and instructed the clerk to proceed with purchase.

Following the retirement of Colin Jenkins, a notice inviting applications to the council to be posted and inserted into Peninsula Papers.

Planning at the Furzy. The clerk reported that the planning permission of 14 dwellings at the Furzy Site had now expired. County Cllr. Reg Owens had asked, through the clerk, for comments from the community council on the indication of interest shown by the prospective developers of the Manse Field site, in applying for extension of that development to incorporate the Furzy site. This would obviate the need for the dangerous access onto Trewarren Road by the Brook pub, as had been approved in the original application. Councilors agreed that this would be a sensible alteration.

BROOKSIDE GREEN EXCAVATIONS:

The clerk reported the extensive communication he had had with Welsh Water about the uncovered hole on the site; the result of incomplete investigative excavation by contractors. The upshot was a promise by W.W. to address the issue, as a matter of priority. HIGHWAYS:

The clerk had asked P.C.C. to ensure the cutting of roadside foliage by and near Coastlands School, in order to reduce the problems at an already dangerous location.

The ceremony consisted of the presentation of an honorary Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE), two British Empire Medals (BEM) and a Queen's RVS Platinum Jubilee Award.

Mrs Patricia Mawuli Porter OBE, founding director of Metal Seagulls and Fafali Aircraft in Haverfordwest, was presented with an Honorary Officer of the Order of the British Empire for services to aviation.

Veteran sports journalist and fundraiser Mr William Carne BEM, of Treffgarne, was presented with a British Empire Medal for services to sport and charity.

Mrs Yvonne Evans BEM, parish clerk to Marloes and St Brides Community Council for 43 years, was presented with a British Empire Medal for voluntary services to the community in Pembrokeshire.

Once completed, we imagine a beautiful, wildlife rich walk (with good surface under foot) to the to the coast, with stunning views across the mere." 

The weather was most definitely with us for the tour of Dale Airfield. Visibility was superb from a number of vantage points along the way for viewing up the Haven and across to the Islands. That was the extra cream on the top of what was a wonderful trip. We are indebted to Dale Castle Estates, Dale Hill Farm and the Lawrence Brothers for allowing us to cross their land, and hence gaining a full appreciation of what is the most complete WW2 airfield in the area. However, it was Malcolm Cullen and his research which put flesh on the skeleton of the airfield. Malcolm gave us a most definitive history of the RAF's time at Dale, with many extra snippets as well.. We are extremely fortunate that Malcolm is willing to share his knowledge with the History group, especially as he always seems to find something new for us!

In June we continue the Military theme but from a very different angle. We will be marking the centenary of three War Memorials in our area, with an overview of WWI given by David Llewellyn. You may feel you have had your fill of WWI, but David's overview does put the conflict into perspective, and explains how things came to be as they were. As it covers the whole conflict, it will encompass areas which the men from here fought in, so seems an appropriate way to remember those who did not come back and whose names are recorded on the War Memorials, but also those who did come back.

Peninsula Papers Update

Firstly we are very happy to report that the joint Cream Teas event with Dale WI on April 21st raised the stunning amount of £1088.92. PP management would like to heartily thank both the members of the WI for their tremendous contribution and those Cream Tea consumers who came along to give their support. This money will tide us over our current shortfall of funds.

However, we must still plan for the future and aim to both save costs and raise money in a regular and systematic way. We have therefore decided to implement two main strategies:

- 1. Each PP costs us about 25p to print so we cannot afford to print copies which are never read. To that end we are proposing to cease delivering PP to holiday homes in the winter when they are mostly unoccupied e.g. October, November, December/January and February. PP will of course be available to read on-line during this period from both the Marloes and Dale Websites. According to the PCNP website the proportion of holiday homes in Dale is nearly 40% and in Marloes nearly 30% so this will save a considerable amount of printing effort and cost. Those holiday home users who regularly use their properties in the winter can be made an exception.
- 2. Implement a Peninsula Papers Supporters Club this will be a type of "100 Club" where a yearly donation will enable members to participate in a twice-yearly draw. More details on this will appear in subsequent editions.

We would like to thank everyone who has made a suggestion for money-raising ideas and for the general level of support which PP has received. This makes the work of all the volunteers involved in editing, printing and distributing somewhat easier to bear!

An astronomical challenge? Dark skies in the National Park

The first part of a three-part article from PCNPA relating to artificial lighting and dark skies

The night sky offers a very direct way for us to connect with nature and the cosmos. However, light pollution excludes many people in the UK from discovering and enjoying the night sky, with its various scientific, historic, spiritual and cultural associations.

This article reviews some the impacts on wildlife caused by light pollution, the local planning framework, things you can do to help, and a new project run by the National Park Authority.

Lighting and wildlife

Inappropriate lighting can affect wildlife profoundly, by disrupting navigation, migration, breeding cycles, feeding habits, the relationships between predators and prey, and so on. Examples include:

- Light pollution disrupts the natural behaviour of bats, especially those that are nocturnal and rely on darkness for navigation and hunting.
- Bright artificial lights can disorient bats, leading to collisions with buildings and other structures.
- Increased light levels can disrupt feeding patterns and reduce foraging efficiency, affecting bat populations and their prey.
- Artificial lights can attract and disorient nocturnal insects, causing them to become trapped, exhausted, or vulnerable to predation.
- Glow-worms, which rely on bioluminescence for mating and communication, can be negatively affected by excessive artificial lighting, as it may interfere with their natural signals.
- Nocturnal migratory birds can become disoriented and collide with illuminated buildings, leading to injuries or death.
- Artificial lights can disrupt the circadian rhythms of birds, affecting their breeding, feeding, and navigation patterns.
- Urban bird species may experience altered feeding patterns, reduced habitat quality, and increased predation risks due to light pollution.
- Artificial lighting can interfere with the natural photoperiod, disrupting seasonal cues for tree growth and dormancy.
- Some trees rely on darkness to trigger flowering and fruiting, and excessive lighting may disrupt these processes.
- Light pollution can also alter the behaviour of nocturnal pollinators, affecting tree reproduction and seed dispersal.

Lighting and planning

Lighting can to some extent be managed through development planning policy. Policy 9 of the Pembrokeshire Coast National Park Local Development Plan 2 (end date 2031) states that:

- "Proposals that are likely to result in a significant level of external artificial lighting being emitted shall include a full lighting scheme and will be permitted:
- a) where the lighting proposed relates to its purpose; and,
- b) where there is no unacceptable adverse effect on the character of the area, local residents, vehicle users, pedestrians, biodiversity and the visibility of the night sky.

Wherever possible opportunities to mitigate potential cumulative impacts on the night sky should be explored."

Lighting is also a planning consideration if it impacts on European protected species, such as bats. Supplementary Planning Guidance on lighting is proposed within Local Development Plan 2.

However, many aspects of household and business lighting are not covered by planning policy and in these cases a voluntary approach to reducing impacts is indicated.

Seagrass Update

A little while has passed since the last seagrass update. I am fairly new with Project Seagrass and now well placed to contribute to the good ongoing work in Dale. I'm pleased to say we have some budget for picking up momentum with general awareness raising and working with the local community and users. I'm looking forward to meeting many of you during Dale Pirate Day on 3rd June!

Unfortunately, one of the seagrass visitor mooring buoys was found washed up earlier in the year, with follow-up inspections finding that the other buoys were not fit for purpose (due to a fault during manufacture). They have now been repaired, approved appropriate and safe and will be reinstalled imminently by Dale Sailing Company. Work is being done to promote their use, and to encourage donations towards their upkeep.

There is also activity this summer to reseed some of the areas of the planted seagrass where it has been lost, topping up what was done previously. Seagrass seeds will be planted by boat and Remote Underwater Vehicles in the same location as previous planting took place. This work has been shared with the Dale Seagrass Stakeholder Group. The seagrass will be surveyed again this September to see how it is establishing.

Windswept Watersports will be running some seagrass paddleboard sessions this summer. If you'd like to learn more about the seagrass/have any ideas for further seagrass-related activities that need some funding, please let me know!



May Blossom

As I sit and write this I am awaiting the most impressive annual event occurring in our garden. The third week in May is about the usual time and it is imminent! I am referring to the flowering of the very large hawthorn tree in our back garden. It is a lovely gnarled multi-stem tree with a canopy measuring 8 metres across. (In the aerial photo taken of our house in 1973 it is a fairly conventional bush measuring about 8 feet across.) The blossom on this tree can be very dense so that you cannot see the leaves and twigs, though some years are better than



others and sometimes the flowers are damaged by cold winds. It does, of course, have quite an odd smell which many people find unpleasant but the bees, flies and hoverflies certainly don't!

The young leaves, flower buds and petals are edible and are referred to as "bread and cheese" – they can be used in salads. I think we may have got this wrong when we were kids – we used to call it "bread and cheese" but we ate the berries sandwiched between leaves and it was pretty horrible!

Its blossoming marks the point at which spring turns into summer, and the old saying 'Cast ne'er a clout ere May is out' almost certainly refers to the opening of hawthorn flowers rather than the end of the month.

Common hawthorn timber is a creamy-brown colour, finely grained and very hard. It can be used in turnery and engraving and to make veneers and cabinets, as well as boxes, tool handles and boat parts. It also makes good firewood and burns at high temperatures.

A hawthorn tree can support hundreds of other species. It is the foodplant for many caterpillars of moths. Its flowers are eaten by dormice and provide nectar and pollen for bees and other pollinating insects. The haws are rich in antioxidants and are eaten by migrating birds, such as redwings, fieldfares and thrushes, as well as small mammals. And the dense, thorny foliage makes fantastic nesting shelter for many species of bird.

May blossom has a long history of traditions and stories attached to it. Hawthorn is a pagan symbol of fertility and has ancient associations with May Day. It was the ancestor of the Maypole and its leaves and flowers the source of May Day garlands as well as appearing in the wreath of the Green Man.

Hawthorn was never brought into the home. It was believed that bringing hawthorn blossom inside would be followed by illness and death, and in medieval times it was said that hawthorn blossom smelled like the Great Plague. Botanists later learned that the chemical trimethylamine in hawthorn blossom is also one of the first chemicals formed in decaying animal tissue, so it is not surprising that hawthorn flowers are associated with death.

So despite this, it is a splendid plant and one to be cherished. I only wish there was more of it around here. Our local hedges are mostly blackthorn unlike further east in the UK. I shall never forget taking off from Gatwick in mid-May one year and being awestruck by the crisscrossing white hedgerows beneath.
