

Kensington, St Brides & Clock tower

The Clock Tower was erected in 1904 by members of the Pembrokeshire Liberal Association, in memory of the 4th Baron Lord Kensington, William Edwardes.

A former MP and member of the House of Lords he had come to live at what is now known as St. Brides Castle in 1880. He died tragically in 1896 while hunting in Scotland. His wife chose a memorial clock as a reminder of his 'remarkable punctuality'. Built of local quarried stone, the Tower stands 30ft high (9m). Owned by Marloes & St. Brides Community Council, it was restored in 2005/6. The tower is opened daily during summer months, an interpretation panel inside explains the story.
