NP/23/0258/FUL - APPROVED

NP/22/0699/FUL - APPROVED

NP/23/0144/FUL - Remains undecided.

NP/22/0402/FUL - APPROVED NP/23/0196/FUL - Remains Undecided. Village Matters - Communication with PCC - Cllrs have been left frustrated again at the lack of communication from PCC over emails sent that are not acknowledged or replied to. Most recently with regard the 20mph speed limit. Cllrs wish to have it extended out to the Gann in order to decrease the risk to pedestrians who use the Coastal Path in to the village. It was agreed to re send the email and copy in the CEO directly. Public Toilets - The update from PCC has confirmed that Dale Public Toilets will NOT close and the income from the carpark will be used to offset the costs. This is subject to the budget setting, but they are confident the outcome will be in our favour. All agreed

Litter – New bins have been put at the top of the slipway by PCC before the Clerk had chance to contact them. It is hoped that the two recycling bins will help ease the amount of takeaway rubbish over the summer.

10th July 2023 Meeting Minutes

Broadway Broadband Installation:

Broadway Fibre Broadband have entered insolvency / administration. 44 properties have not been reached as suggested. Email sent to Local MP and MS by Community Council seeking answers.

Village Benches: Gill Phillips and Marloes Welcome Club proposed the new installation of benches across Marloes and St Brides Community, asking for the support from the Community Council. All Cllrs were happy to propose the new installation of benches. Cllr CJ to apply for funding through the Enhancing Pembrokeshire Grant (Cllr CJ has requested application forms). Cllr CJ to work alongside the Welcome Club to submit the application for funding.

Recreation Area / Playing Fields / Village Hall: Cllr CJ has discussed a potential new pedestrian access to the playing field (using funds from the Enhancing Pembrokeshire Grant Funding) with Mark Burton. The proposal has been agreed with the playing field committee. Cllr CJ leading on Enhancing Pembrokeshire Grant Funding application. Cllr LB confirmed all improvement work had been completed to the park (via Enhancing Pembrokeshire Grant Funding).

Clock Tower: PCNPA have completed work to the new Clock Tower path. Cllrs confirmed they have done an excellent job. Highways: Clerk has set up a Marloes and St Brides online portal with Pembs CC to report issues easier moving forward. Potholes across the community discussed and

reported by Clerk on the Pembs CC website. Cllr Reg Owens informed of the ongoing Highway issues via email.

National Trust: The damaged Car Park hut has been removed. No timescales on a replacement shed from the National Trust. St Brides Walled Garden: Clerk emailed Gary Meopham (PCNPA) for update on scheduled meeting. Please see the email thread below. Gary phoned and gave the feedback below.

- "I. Director of Planning (Sara Morris) has informally visited the site
- 2. The buildings are being used for educational use (and will continue)
- 3. PCNPA are happy that there is no danger in using the buildings in the short term
- 4. A June meeting has been scheduled for PCNPA to discuss in further detail
- 5. Gary emphasised it is a long term plan (it's not a quick fix)
- 6. Community groups will be consulted at every point of the decision making process (promised)
- 7. Gary recommended a community stakeholder group visit to the site (early Autumn) around apple pressing season for the Cllrs to have a good old look around (and ask questions). Will add to the agenda in July for further discussion 2

Cllrs not pleased with the responses / lack of action from PCNPA. Cllr CJ to email Yvonne Evans to discuss a joint approach with the Church committee to approaching PCNPA regarding the St Brides Walled Garden.

Cllr SP to take photos of lack of upkeep to buildings to support Cllrs CJ action above. **Hedge Cutting:** Cllr discussed requirement for hedge cutting across Marloes and St Brides Community Council district (including Glebe lane footpath (please see 4.3). Clerk explain process with PCC through the online portal. Cllrs will take photos / pinpoint problem hedge cutting areas and send to Clerk (who in turn will

report to PCC online portal).

Pembrokeshire County Council 2nd / Empty Homes Consultation: Community Councils / second home owners / the communities of Pembrokeshire have been asked by PCC to respond with their views around the 2nd / Empty Homes Consultation. Via an online survey. Cllrs put their views across and decided to ensure a fair and consistent approach that Cllrs would submit their views individually. Voted and approved by all Cllrs during the meeting.

Hywel Dda Consultation: Cllr CJ handed out consultation documents to all Cllrs regarding the upcoming Hywel Dda Consultation. Cllr LB will distribute to Coastland school who can send the document out to parents.

Planning matters / PCNPA Development Control updates:

NP/22/0314/FUL: Philbeach Farm, Dale, Haverfordwest, Pembrokeshire, SA62 3QU. Conversion of redundant RAF wireless building which has been used for agricultural storage but is now in a bad state of repair into holiday let use. Contrary to LDP Policy 7 – likely to be sent to Members under extended delegation for decision or a future Committee meeting

NP/23/0233/FUL: Marloes Mere, Marloes, Haverfordwest, Pembrokeshire, SA62 3BH. Removal of southern reservoir bunds, relocation of Public Right of Way, implementation of new southern boundary hedgerow & new causeway path at Britton Hide with new tractor gate. Comments added in previous meeting

NP/23/0300/FUL: Harveys Cottage, Marloes, Haverfordwest, Pembrokeshire, SA62 3AZ. Flat roof rear extension to existing dwelling plus alterations to the existing internal layout. Comments added to PCNPA website. Cllrs happy with planning, but would recommend solar panels.

NP/23/0329/FUL: North Haven Wardens

House, Skomer Island, Nr Martins Haven, Marloes, Haverforwest, SA62 3BJ. Small extension to the exterior of the existing building to house a composting toilet. Comments added to PCNPA. Cllrs in full support.

AOB and Next Marloes & St Brides Community Council meeting date.

Cllr CJ to write to PCC and local County Cllr / MP to express dissatisfaction with the new flecsi bus system. Community Cllrs have received a large number of complaints from local residents.

Minutes of the business meeting held on 16th August, 2023 in the Sports Club Before the start of the meeting, Mr. Stoddart attended to offer his services as community councillor. Mr. Stoddart was advised by council that the positions had already been filled by co-option and was politely thanked for his interest. Mr. Stoddart then left. N.B. Unlike County councillors, Community councillors are voluntary and do not claim expenses.

John Everett. Also, before the meeting started, the clerk led a few words of remembrance and prayers for Cllr. John Everett, whose unexpected death had occurred recently. He was a wise and valued colleague, a friend and servant of St Ishmaels for over forty years as a community councillor and his loss is felt deeply in the village and beyond. Our thoughts and prayers are with Janet, Katy and the family.

Brook Lake. The clerk reported that, despite several calls to P.C.C. re: cleaning of Brook Lake stream, the work had not yet been done. The council will be asked again and C Cllr. Reg Owen will be contacted about the failure of the P.C.C. to act.

NEW COUNCILLORS.: The local coun-

cil elections were in 2022, when no new candidates had offered themselves for election. Subsequently, on the retirement of Cllr. Colin Jenkins, and after a period of three month's advertising to replace him, there had been no formal response. Due also to the unexpected recent death of Cllr John Everett after a period of illness, two residents from the village were then approached, both of whom agreed to be coopted. Mr. Stuart Carpenter and Mr. Graham Ninnis have been accepted for the vacant posts. It is noted that next public local elections will be in 2027.

WAR MEMORIAL: Members of the war memorial sub-committee reported that the quote for extracting the present plaque from the wall of the Memorial Hall was £17. 500 and that the builders were not prepared to accept responsibility for the plaque being damaged or broken in the process. The council discussed this and decided that such funds be better spent towards the engraving of a new plaque on the proposed new memorial. Also, after detailed analysis of the engineering problems that would occur by erection of the memorial on the Brookside Green site, with a stream and a main sewer running beneath, the original site on the Burgage Green was agreed, as this is Common Land and would present no foundation problems.

PLAY PARK: The clerk had been requested by the Chair of the Play Park Committee that the council sanction the repair of the rotted part of the arch on the park. As the community council had no connection with the running of the park, apart from taking responsibility for the insurance, it was agreed to reassure the Play Park Committee there would be no objection as far as it was concerned.

LOOK OUT FOR SEPSIS

On 26th March 2021 Hannah Brown, a Cumberland livestock farmer, died just two days after developing Sepsis. Sepsis is a life-threatening condition which arises when the body's response to infection injures its own tissues and organs. If not treated immediately it can lead to organ failure and death. It can be treated with antibiotics and early diagnosis is the key.

Those in the agricultural industry are particularly vulnerable to Sepsis as their work means they are more likely to suffer cuts and bruises which can become infected and lead to Sepsis.

Sepsis can also be caused by injuries from trauma or from illness.

So keep Sepsis in mind if you see any of the symptoms shown on the list to the right.

SEEK MEDICAL HELP URGENTLY IF YOU (OR ANOTHER ADULT) DEVELOP ANY OF THESE SIGNS:

- Slurred speech or confusion
- Extreme shivering or muscle pain
- Passing no urine (in a day)
- Severe breathlessness
- It feels like vou're aoing to die
- Skin mottled or discoloured.

A child may have sepsis if he or she:

- Is breathing very fast
- Has a 'fit' or convulsion
- Looks mottled, bluish, or pale
- Has a rash that does not fade when you press it
- Is very lethargic or difficult to wake
- · Feels abnormally cold to touch.

If you spot any of these signs, call 999 or go straight to A&E.

Dona Marika 50th Anniversary

The 50th anniversary of the grounding of the Dona Marika was marked with a display of photographs and other memorabilia at St. Ishmaels Sports & Social Club. The display was centred around the ship's bell which was given to the community of St Ishmaels in March 1974. Coastlands Local History Group was pleased to welcome Mrs. Hazel Fraser on Friday afternoon. Her late husband Gordon Fraser had been one partner of the Hedley Fraser Group who with the Milford Dry Dock Company, the Alexandria Towing Company, Swansea and others had secured the removal of the ship on the 13th November 1973. Mrs. Fraser was accompanied by two members of her family, and also by Mrs. Georgina Llewellin. The two families have continued a friendship which started at the time of the grounding. The picture above shows Mrs. Hazel Fraser, Mrs. Georgina Llewellin and Mr. Philip Edwards who lived in the village at the time, and is a committee member of the History Group. There was a good response over the weekend, and more information has

come forward on the grounding, the people involved, and local information on the evacuation of the crew from the boat and villagers who had to leave home very quickly. The Bell carries the name of Thorsorn (Thor's Eagle) - the original name of the Norwegian vessel with 1954 as the year of origin. The display (but not the Bell), is now on show at the Heritage Centre, South Street, Dale for the rest of the summer. The History Group is grateful to St. Ishmaels Sports & Social Club for hosting the event.

"People are invited to open the box, take out the notepad, read what others have written and write down a few lines about the moments they've had connecting with nature.



Roughed it in peacetime, too, you did, out on the island:


Days and weeks and months, none of the current comforts.

I had told my audience that English oak timbers from *Albion* (and possibly her near sister paddle steamer *Queen* which sank off Skokholm) show up from time to time; and I had emphasised that they could be distinguished by the pegged construction – well, what should I come across at the Churchill end of the beach but this beautiful specimen...?




Hoverflies

I recently had an email from a colleague who had found an exciting insect on the buddleias at St Brides car park. It turned out to be a Hornet Hoverfly, which is the largest hoverfly in the UK. It has only just recently reached Pembrokeshire, having spread from the south east of England. This was exciting news so the next day when I went into the conservatory to be faced with a large cross and buzzing stripy creature at least I knew what it was! We have since seen up to 2 in the garden feeding on mint flowers. They are impressive beasts as befits their name, about 2 cms long and quite broad, with a yellow face, huge brown eyes, a chestnut thorax and black and yellow striped body. The Latin name is Volucella zonaria. From this picture you can tell it is a hoverfly from the way it parks its wings in a delta shape.

The Hornet Hoverfly has a close relative, Volucella pellucens, or Pied Hoverfly, which we also found in the garden on the same flowers as its larger cousin. This one looks a bit like a bumble bee and is black with a broad white stripe.

Most hoverflies are much smaller and slighter creatures – in fact they often have very slim bodies which makes them seem quite insubstantial. One of the most well- known is the Marmalade Hoverfly, so-named because of its orange coloration which of course you can't see in this picture. There are many similar hoverflies, often striped in black, white or yellow and they can be easily seen on summer garden flowers such as buddleia, mint, marjoram and all sorts of daisies as they feed on nectar and pollen. It is fun to try and identify them though unfortunately there always seem to be many similar species!



Like other flies, hoverflies go through all stages of insect life: egg-larva-pupa-adult. The larvae of hoverflies are remarkably diverse

for just one family of flies. Some have adapted to aquatic life in extremely dirty water (including stagnant), eating all kinds of decaying materials. In order to breathe they developed a long pipe at the rear end of the body, which they stick into the air. Examples include the rat-tailed maggots (about 40 species). Other larvae hunt for plant lice or aphids. Some live in decaying wood, or sap runs on live trees (33 species). Over one third of hoverflies have larvae that eat aphids (over 110 species) – they can provide a useful degree of aphid control.
