

Harvest Festivals – There will be Festivals held at both churches in September – see Service List. Contributions for both Festivals will be welcome, and it is hoped that many from the Community will come along to one or both events.

Sale of Cards - Looking for Birthday or other greeting cards, and want to avoid a trip to town, then at St. Peter's Church there is a table near the church organ with cards on display. All cards are 20p each, and contributions can be put in the offertory box near the door.

Internal Baptistery at St. Peter's – Over the summer months. the Baptistery to the right of the Church door is uncovered. Installed in 1874, the tiled pool was designed for baptism by total immersion. It was only used on three occasions before 1900, and not since. There are steps to enter the pool, but no drain for the water. Water to fill the pool was probably obtained from the Church Well which was then near the top of the Glebe Lane – since filled in. Local Residents who may not have seen this unusual feature are welcome to visit in September up to the 26th when the pool will be covered over prior to the Harvest Festival.

On **Monday 15th September** the secretary of the Dutch War Memorial Committee in Mierlo-Hout near Helmond, together with her father, Harrie Raaijmakers (who is a founder of this group), will visit and view the War Memorial, which 'Tish has very gently twinned with theirs since both are unique, contemporary and special.

Harrie and Sandra will see the new War Memorial at **11.30am** and then go to The Brook for a pint. All very relaxed, but if anybody was around at this time it would be lovely if they could say "Hi" to them. (The 15th Sept is the first anniversary of the Inauguration of the new 'Tish War Memorial).

These Dutch connections are proving rather interesting. Amongst others, a number of brave Dutch fishermen motored over to here as the Germans invaded The Netherlands. Their trawlers became mine sweepers, a very dangerous task indeed. Several lost their lives and are buried in Milford Haven Cemetery. Some of the sailors also married local girls and more work is now underway looking deeper into this whole connection.

Co-option of new Cllr

Chair Maren Hamre welcomed the application from Nick Skudder and co-opted Cllr NS into the open vacancy for Marloes and St Brides Community Council. Congratulations Nick and welcome aboard.

Community Issues Open Reach Fibre Broadband

Clirs discussed broadband progression across the community council. Issues with landline phones discussed. Agenda point to be amended to Digital Switch Over moving forward.

Footpaths and Beach

Cllrs found the three words location for the dog bin (hedgehog, mermaid and scouls (the footpath side of the gate if possible). Clerk to follow up with PCC and National Parks regarding collection.

Cllrs discussed overgrown hedges / footpaths in the community. Cllr PS to liaise with National Parks to support cutting of hedges.

Recreation Area / Playing Fields / Village Hall

The Enhancing Pembrokeshire Grant will be applied for by the Community Council with the Playing Field Committee's support regarding the new fencing and local benches. Cllr CJ has sourced a quote on the works for the new fencing. Cllr CJ will follow on quote and additional work required by local working parties before making application to Enhancing Pembrokeshire Grant.

St Brides Walled Garden

County Councillor Claire George confirmed Libby from National Parks will be happy to accommodate a site visit over the summer to discuss the next steps around the St Brides Walled Garden.

Cllr SP to send the clerk available dates for the visit (clerk to liaise with County Council CG and Libby to set up a visit).

Village Benches

Clerk has applied for funding through the Democratic Engagement Grant (under £1,000). The grant was unsuccessful. Clerk has applied through coastal cottages/ Visit Pembs for £1,000 to support the benches request from the community. The Community Council acknowledged the correspondence received from the Welcome Club and other community groups in Marloes requested an update on the installation of new village benches. The Community Council are working on sourcing ex-

ternal grant funding to purchase the benches, working closely with PCC.

Bus Service

Cllrs confirmed the re-appointment of the coastal bus routes (Puffin Shuttle service) is a great success for the local community. The bus routes were re-instated due to the consultation and complaints made by the Community Council.

Correspondence received from the Welcome Club welcoming the extension to bus services in the local area.

Minutes of the business meeting held on 23rd July, 2025 in the Sports Club
War Memorial. Richard Jenkins was thanked by the council for establishing the wonderful display of poppies, cornflowers and other flowers around the memorial.

Community Councils

He suggested that this should now be extended along the bank to the public conveniences. This was agreed. Richard was asked if he could supply a quote for connecting electricity to the memorial for floodlighting.

Anti social behaviour. It was reported that one family in the village appear to be responsible for a spate of anti-social behaviour and severe harassment. This seems to be an ongoing problem and councillors advised that anyone affected should contact our C.P.S.O., Adam Thomas of Dyfed-Powys Police and/or ATEB Housing Assoc.

Vice Chairman

Due to the retirement of the previous vice chairman, Colin Jenkins, Cllr Richard Jenkins was asked if he would fulfil the role. He agreed and, in the absence of Moira Hawkins, was asked to sign the minutes of the previous meeting.

Sessions of bus reform community discussions. These are coming to Southwest Wales. The clerk agreed to affix posters of these sessions which would affect our community on the notice boards in the village. Much dissatisfaction was expressed by councillors on the Ffleccisi Bus service, it's tardiness irregularity and range. It is still a cause for great concern that, since the loss of a regular bus service through St Ishmaels, the village has to rely on the vagaries of Ffleccis Bus, whilst Marloes and Herbrandston still have access to regular bus services.

The community council have been asked if they're willing to take over the steward-ship of the defibrillators which are situated around the village. The clerk was asked to consult with Mr. Malcolm Smith-Gosling on the operation and costs of doing so.

War Memorial

Councillors were reminded that on the 15th of September, there will be a short ceremony and reception for two members of Merlo-Hout Liberation Memorial Committee in Holland, who are visiting St. Ishmaels with the express intention of seeing our memorial and establishing a link through it with the Dutch town. 
Notice Board

Dale Changing Places Toilet Project Launches

The local PERKY Charity has set its sights on securing a Changing Places Toilet in Dale. These facilities are critical in providing those with profound learning disabilities as well as those with severely limited mobility safe and secure facilities to use. Without these facilities, those needing them are severely limited in getting out and about or at risk hygienically as well as put through the indignity of changing on a toilet floor or at the beach or car park.

With the success of Windswept in providing access to the water for clients with these types of disabilities this project seems like both a worthy cause and very relevant for Dale and the wider community. The facility would be available for use by anyone that needs it, so that might include those who live here and holidaymakers lacking facilities at home. Modern technology allows key code access via a QR code or similar. These types of changing place facility include height adjustable changing benches, ceiling hoist, slip resistant flooring and space for two carers to help the user by providing a toilet which has transfer space either side.

A site for the facility has been found close to the existing public toilets. There is much work to do of course but the key elements will be securing full planning permission and raising between £80k to £100k to build it. PERKY intend the facility to be open for use in the summer of 2027.




Dale WI

Solar Power - an update from Nicholas Cawley

I have an update for my piece in the Peninsula Papers in the June issue.

I can report that our best performance of the solar system this year was a generation of 46KWH and an export back to the grid of 37 KWH in one day at the end of April. That was because it was full sun from sunrise to sunset. I am convinced that if it wasn't for the early morning fog and low cloud around the longest day in June we could have exceeded 50KWH and possibly as high as 60KWH or at least some where in between and and export back to the grid in excess of 40KWH.

We were tested yesterday the first of August with a power cut from 1230pm to just prior to 2pm. I can report the our system worked well and that we had lighting, TV and a kettle for a tea or coffee. We would also have been able to prepare a hot meal if we had wanted. This would have meant that if the cut had been in the darkness of winter our batteries would have run the house for more than two days if weather was poor. But we may have had to alternate between the kettle, cooker and heating system as we wouldn't be able to run all three at the same time.

I hope this information is helpful for anyone thinking of going down this road and if anyone would like to see the system then give me a call.

Moth Morning at Orlandon Kilns

On July 4th I did a "Moth Morning" in my garden (as advertised in PP!). 6 interested locals turned up for a look at the contents of the moth trap together with coffee and homemade biscuits. The star moths were undoubtedly two fresh and huge Privet Hawk Moths (see below for a picture) which behaved very well and showed us their pink stripes. Buff-tip. Swallowtail Moth, Peppered Moth and Elephant Hawk-moth were also popular. People are always amazed that these huge colourful things are flying around at night. They are also flabbergasted when I tell



them how many species I have recorded in the garden (621) though I explain that my garden may be a bit unusual as it surrounded by lots of different habitats – reedbed,



marsh, stream, wet woodland, grassy fields and hedgerows while coastal habitats like salt marsh and clifftop grassland are close by. The garden itself also has good habitats – orchard, pond, shrubs etc.

Planning for an event like this is a bit tricky – you need a morning with decent weather – no rain, not too much wind – and the night before needs to be relatively good for mothing. I had to bring this event forward by one day as the forecast was poor for the original day,

which affected the number of people who could come.

The final touch to the event was a visit to the lure by a Lunar Hornet Moth - every-

one was most intrigued to find out that this wasp-like insect was actually a moth!

We will do it again next year!

You may just want to have a leisurely stroll around the orchard and soak up the atmosphere, or bring a rug and have a picnic in the walled garden.



Small electrical items now accepted in kerbside recycling collections

Pembrokeshire residents can now recycle small electrical goods as part of their weekly kerbside recycling service.

This initiative aims to reduce the amount of electrical waste going into black bags and instead ensure it is properly recycled.

From now on, household items such as kettles, hair dryers, small toasters, irons, and other similar-sized handheld electricals can be placed loose on top of your recycling containers for collection on your usual recycling day.

The accepted items include:

- Handheld kitchen appliances, kettles and toasters (4 slice max) and small coffee machines
- Hairdryers and hair straighteners
- Handheld power tools
- Radios
- Irons

Extension leads, power cables and battery chargers

The expanded service also includes e-cigarettes and vapes (with batteries removed). These should be placed in a clear plastic bag and set on top of your containers, following the same process used for household batteries.

Additionally, the range of household batteries accepted for recycling has been extended. Residents can now include:

- Rechargeable batteries from laptops, mobile phones and power tools
- Lithium button batteries

Standard batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, DD, 9v)

Please note: Larger electrical items — such as TVs, vacuum cleaners, microwaves, fridges, freezers, air fryers, and car batteries — are not included in this kerbside collection. These can be recycled at your nearest Waste and Recycling Centre.

Together, we can reduce waste and protect the environment by recycling electricals responsibly.

Research has shown that most of us have unwanted electricals we want to get rid of. On average there are at least 30 electricals hidden away in drawers in UK homes, a total of 880 million items across the UK - with a simple repair many could be donated or sold to people who could put them to good use.

If you think you can repair rather than recycle your items visit the <u>repair directory</u> for recommendations.

Please also note that there are now facilities at Winsle for the recycling of hard plastic - such things as children's toys, plastic trays and boxes, and plant pots and seed trays. A good excuse for a thorough clear-out of the shed or garage!!



Marloes Village Hall talk Thursday July 31st: Whales, Dolphins, and Porpoises

This talk would have been given by Nadia Tomsa of Sea Trust Wales, a charity based at the Ocean Lab in Goodwick; unfortunately Nadia was indisposed and her colleagues Rebecca Herbert and James Shelton kindly stepped in at short notice.

The evening was a great success with a very good turnout and, importantly, children whose parents said afterwards that it had really stoked their enthusiasm for marine wildlife: certainly, many questions were asked at the display table. We learnt much: for example, seals are in fact better breath-holders than dolphins; and, as for Nature being red in tooth and claw – the Bottlenose Dolphin is, to be succinct, not at all nice. James showed us many drone videos: the overhead view is excellent for seeing how marine mammals interact; and, when the water is clear enough, you can follow them submerged far better than you ever could from the shore.

If Pembrokeshire whale sightings keep increasing, hopefully Sea Trust might come back some time in the future to give us an update!

Birds and Ants

On 10th July, whilst sitting in the garden in the evening sampling a pleasant Sauvignon Blanc, we were alerted to some small bird activity in the vicinity of a small paved area next to a buddleia. After watching for a while we realised that a juvenile Great Tit was actively "anting" – picking up an ant from the paving and stuffing it under its wing. It did this for about 10 minutes. It was the first time we had seen a tit doing this – usually it is Blackbirds (actually, at the moment, one particular Blackbird) and Great Spotted Woodpeckers. We are used to seeing this activity in our garden but there is very little actually known about it.



It is widely thought to be due to the bird deriving some benefit from the formic acid emitted by the ants such as reducing avian parasites in the feathers. However there is no proof of this, and the amounts of formic acid would be so low (these are very small black ants) that it is difficult to believe that it would have much effect. And why was only one bird doing it? Maybe it just feels nice? Or another theory is that the birds are removing the formic acid from the ant in order to eat it – this seems ludicrous as birds are usually happy to eat ants, formic acid and all. Or maybe the chemicals in the ant fluids supplement the oils from the birds' preen gland.

An interesting experiment in America with Blue Jays seemed to prove that the activity is instinctive. Some young Blue Jays which had never seen an ant were presented with either normal ants or ones that had their formic acid dispensers removed. The jays presented with formic-acid-less ants just gobbled them up. The ones presented with ants complete with formic acid, immediately started to "ant" with them. Which explains why a Great Tit only 6 weeks out of the nest was able to do it.

There is also something called "passive anting" where a bird allows ants to run over its plumage, and while doing so often adopts a strange pose, leaning over with one wing out, rump feathers splayed, with its necked kinked and beak open. They look really odd, as if they are in a trance. We see Blackbirds doing this often – but not always where there are ants – they often seem to be just sunbathing. Again this may help with feather maintenance.



So all a bit if a mystery!

Immediately after the "anting" episode we realised that there were flying ants emerging from the paving. They were immediately gobbled up by Chiffchaffs, Great Tits and Blue Tits, followed by a Robin and a Blackbird. Those that escaped flew upward into the gape of the ever-hungry Swallows!

But as mentioned above we regularly see birds eating ants, not just the flying sort. We have a Great Spotted Woodpecker who flies into the garden, straight to the paving through the middle of the lawn, where he proceeds to hoover up ants for many minutes at a time.
